STATE BUDGET FAILS WHEATBELT

Despite posting a whopping \$3.2 billion surplus, the 2024/25 State Budget has done little to support Western Australian's struggling with the increasing cost-of-living crisis. Treasurer Saffioti's first budget made it clear that the gargantuan METRONET project, now blown out to \$12.6 billion, is more important to Labor than supporting WA families. Beyond an inflationary and non-means-tested electricity credit, there was little to ease the pressure which continues to mount for households, and while I have no doubt the credit will be welcome relief to many, it just masks the fact that power, water, the emergency services levy, driver's licenses, and car registrations are all going up. There were no major projects or initiatives announced for the Central Wheatbelt electorate, despite the state of our roads, the lack of housing and poor power infrastructure. All the Government could muster was \$15m to start planning for water infrastructure upgrades.

Leader of the Opposition Shane Love recently announced that if The Nationals WA are returned to Government, we'd take a fresh approach to disaster management.

A WA Resilience & Recovery Agency, modelled on similar agencies already operating successfully in other jurisdictions, would ensure WA communities could rebuild, recover, and reconnect sooner and more effectively in the aftermath of a disaster.

The agency would also take the lead in administering funding following disasters,

ensuring it reaches those in need in a timely manner, reducing the haphazard approach to recovery grants, and providing greater transparency and accountability. A dedicated recovery capability will take pressure off local governments, emergency service volunteers, community groups and other agencies.

After the State Government's woeful response to Cyclone Seroja, which saw just \$8.8 million out of a promised \$104.5 million Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements package reach the ground, we need a change.

MORTLOCK GARDENS GREEN LIGHT

I'm pleased to announce after many months of correspondence, raising the issue in Parliament on a number of occasions, and the advocacy of the Avon Community Development Foundation, the second stage of Mortlock Gardens housing project in Northam is underway. The State Government should be making it easier for these projects to proceed — not put blocks in the way — I'm glad the Minister and Department finally got on board with the vision to create much needed housing for the community.





I recently took the opportunity to acknowledge past and present members of the CWA in Parliament. For 100 years they have campaigned for issues they believe in to persuade the Government to change or introduce new policy, fundraised to support worthy causes, and created a network to rally around those who need assistance. Confident, articulate women with a purpose are a force to be reckoned with. In its own practical and pragmatic way, CWA has created a space for women to build their skills and confidence, and better our community.

BODDINGTON AGED CARE

The community of Boddington has tirelessly advocated for an aged care facility for the seniors that have contributed so much over their lives in the district. While investments over the years have built independent living units and innovative service support like the Ageing in Place care model have assisted, there are still too many of our seniors having

to leave the district when they need the support of family and friends. On my recent visit to Boddington, candidate for Central Wheatbelt Lachlan Hunter and I met with the Shire and local residents — and I will be raising the matter with the Minister for Health and in Parliament to support your call for better aged care services in the town.

Over the past three months I have hit the road between Parliamentary sitting weeks to meet with local Shire's and community groups throughout the electorate. With 27 in the Central Wheatbelt it takes some time, but I appreciate the time Councillors and staff take to meet with myself and Lachlan Hunter.
